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#### NOTES FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR:

Every iourney begins with a single step. This play is no different. In the fictional world of the play. Graceanna Brown and Mary Catherine Stamp walk into each other's lives, hearts, and memories, and become indelibly intertwined in wavs undiscovered until much later. The woman who introduced me to Long Road is a gentle yet formidable force. While our paths did and do not cross very often she has left a strong impression on both my approach to theatrical artistry and life. Fifteen years ago, while chatting over a meal during one of the major combined auditions to which we travel in search of professional performers, she and I were sharing things that excited us about our upcoming seasons. As she described a new play - Long Road to Freedom -her face lit up! "You need to do this play! What a glorious character piece, unfolding into a timely, poignant story. It's layered, deeply layered, historically and emotionally. These two women, and how their intertwined lives began at a stop on the

Underground Railroad is both uplifting and heartrending." At least that's what I think I remember her saying. It was some fifteen years ago. These days, it seems I can't even remember what decision we made in a design meeting vesterday so I am probably horribly misquoting and reinterpreting her words. Yet her passion for the piece, her delight in describing the characters, her conviction in the themes running throughout the script is what my heart and mind remembers. Following their production she sent the script we share with you today: for which I owe her a huge debt of gratitude. From the day I first read Jan's "poetry in motion" script I have wanted to share it with our audiences. Nine years later, the opportunity came around. It is, with deepest thanks and warmest heart that I sincerely thank Carol North, who was Artistic Director of Metro Theater Company in St. Louis, Missouri, for introducing me to this play, but mostly for being the best long-distance mentor a person could have as a friend. Carol, as I discovered in Mary Catherine and Graceanna's story — while we have shared less than a summer's worth of days together in person — our lives are irrevocably intertwined. I truly appreciate your gracious demeanor, insightful artistic approach, and passion for creating quality theatre for youth. I look forward to many years of wrapping myself in an oversized knit shawl and channeling my inner Carol.

#### NAMES OF THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

Who were Harriet Beecher-Stowe, Levi Coffin and Frederick Douglass? What did Harriet Tubman or William Garrison have to do with the Underground Railroad? These are important names in the fight to free slaves during the 1800s. Have each member of your family choose one of the names listed above and see if you can't discover four reasons why they are important to the history of the United States and the fight to end slavery.

#### CREATE YOUR OWN FUN

Children of the civil war era, and especially slave children, had to be inventive with the games they played and the toys they had. They had to create games by using what they had around them. For example, in *Long Road to Freedom*, Graceanna and Mary Catherine talk of making corn husk dolls. Look for and find recycled items around your house. Things such as: tape dispensers, toilet paper/paper towel tubes, paper clips, plastic bottles, tissue boxes, rubber bands, etc.

Then use the objects to invent some your own game. You and your family will need to create the rules for how to play the game. Then play a few times with your family to see if all your ideas work!

#### **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

- 1. When Graceanna was scared she turned to music to lift her spirits. What do you do you when you are scared? What do you do to make yourself feel more comfortable? Hopeful? Courageous?
- 2. Music is used throughout *Long Road to Freedom* to help tell the story. How did the music make you feel? How did the music help tell the story? If someone were to write a story about you, what music would you want to use to tell it?



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
