Your role in the play

You may wish to have a discussion with your class about your upcoming LCT experience and their role as audience members. Remind your students that theatre can only exist with an audience. Your students' energy and response directly affects the actors onstage. The quality of the performance depends as much on the audience as it does on each of the theatre professionals behind the scenes and on stage.

Young audiences should know that watching live theatre is not like watching more familiar forms of entertainment; they cannot pause or rewind us like a DVD, there are no commercials for bathroom breaks,



nor can they turn up the volume to hear us if someone else is talking. Your students are encouraged to listen and watch the play intently, so that they may laugh and cheer for their favorite characters when it is appropriate.

At the end of the play, applause is an opportunity for your students to thank the actors, while the actors are thanking you for the role you played as an audience.

Play Synopsis

Found guilty for a crime he didn't commit, Stanley is sentenced to 18 months at Camp Green Lake, a correction facility for juvenile delinquents. There is no water at Camp Green Lake, just lots of barren, dry, hot land in the middle of Texas. Stanley doesn't blame himself, he blames the curse placed on his family on account of his "no good, pig stealin' great-great great grandfather."


The story goes that Stanley's great-great great grandfather Elya promises a fortune teller by the name of Madame Zeroni a ride up the mountain for helping him win his true love's hand in marriage. But once Elya realizes that Myra is not the girl for him, he forgets his promise and a curse is placed on the Yelnats descendents.

At Camp Green Lake, Stanley meets the boys of Tent D: X-Ray, Armpit, Magnet, ZigZag, and Zero. He also meets Mr. Pendanski, the counselor, Mr. Sir, the disciplinarian, and the Warden, a mysterious lady who has the boys do one task all day long. The boys dig holes: 5 feet in diameter and 5 feet deep. The boys are told they're digging holes to "build character," and if they find anything "interesting" to report it immediately. When Stanley finds a fish fossil it is ignored. But then one day, Stanley finds a gold metal tube and X-ray demands the tube so he can get the reward: the day off from digging.

The initials on the tube stand for Katherine Barlow, known as the famous outlaw Kissin' Kate Barlow. Kate was once the school teacher of Green Lake, but she kissed a African American man by the name of Sam, a bright, kind onion picker. The Sheriff and Trout Walker, a prominent town citizen who has a crush on Kate, kill Sam and unleash Kate's rebellious side. Kate and her gang robbed Stanley Yelnats the First, revitalizing the curse.

After finding the metal tube, Stanley becomes suspicious of what is going on at Camp Green Lake. Stanley befriends Zero, discovers he cannot read, and agrees to give him reading lessons in exchange for Zero doing some of Stanley's digging. The boys do not think it is fair for Stanley to not have to dig his holes and Zig-Zag and Stanley get into a fight. Mr. Sir, Pendanski, and the Warden come to find out what is going on. Mr. Sir calls Zero stupid and he runs away from camp, and Stanley takes the water truck and escapes to find his friend.

As Stanley searches the desert for Zero, stories from the past interweave, giving Stanley clues to the mystery of Camp Green Lake. Stanley finds Zero and they return quietly to camp. They dig in Stanley's hole and find a suitcase containing treasure. After a standoff with the Warden, a host of poisonous lizards, and Ms. Morengo, Stanley's lawyer, Stanley and Zero are released.

Did you know that Stanley Yelnats is a palindrome? A word, phrase, or sentence that reads the same forwards or backwards is called a palindrome. How many words can you think of that are palindromes? Start with three and four letter words such as "wow" and "noon." Can you write an entire palindrome sentence?

Consider how climate changes influence other aspects of living, such as economic prospects, housing, clothing, plant life, etc. What are the long-term effects of severe climate conditions such as droughts or floods?

Your Family Tree

An interesting part of the story of *Holes* is the connection it makes to Stanley's ancestors. In the beginning, he knows a little about his family's past, but by the end Stanley has discovered a whole lot more about his history. Interview the oldest relative you can find. This may be your great-grandfather, your grandmother, an aunt or uncle, or any other relative you are able to interview. Ask them the following questions.

- 1. What is your full name?
- 2. Who is your oldest living relative?
- 3. What country or countries did your ancestors come from?
- 4. Can you share an interesting story that was told to you by an elderly relative?

Contextual Article

Louis Sachar

Louis Sachar was born in East Meadow, New York to Robert and Ruth (Raymin) Sachar, and moved to Tustin, California when he was nine. He grew up in "a happy, normal suburban family," and though he enjoyed school, he did not become interested in reading and writing until high school, when he was inspired by the work of J. D. Salinger and Kurt Vonnegut.

After graduating from high school, Sachar attended Antioch College for a semester before transferring to University of California, Berkeley, during which time he began working at an elementary school to earn college credit. Sachar later recalled, "I thought it over and decided it was a pretty good deal. College credits, no homework, no term papers, no tests, all I had to do was help out in a second/third grade class at Hillside Elementary School. Besides helping out in a classroom, I also became the Noontime Supervisor, or "Louis the Yard Teacher" as I was known to the kids. It became my favorite college class, and a life changing experience."

Sachar graduated from UC Berkeley in 1976 with a degree in Economics, and began working on Sideways Stories From Wayside School, a children's book set at an elementary school with supernatural elements. Sachar has said that he draws very little from personal experience, explaining that "....my personal experiences are kind of boring. I have to make up what I put in my books."

Sachar wrote Sideways Stories at night over the course of nine months, during which he worked during the day in a Connecticut sweater warehouse. After being fired from the warehouse, Sachar decided to go to law school, around which time Sideways Stories From Wayside School was accepted for publication. The book was released in 1978; though it was not widely distributed and subsequently did not sell very well, Sachar began to accumulate a fan base among young readers. By 1989, his books were selling well enough that Sachar was able to begin

writing full-time.

In 1998, Sachar published what has become his best-known book, Holes. A darker and scarier work than his previous books, Holes sold more than five million copies and won several awards, including the presigious Newbery Medal. When Holes was made into a film in 2003, Sachar wrote the screenplay and made a cameo appearance as Mr. Collingwood.

Though Sachar followed Holes with four new installments in the Marvin Redpost book series in 1999 and 2000, and a short Holes spin-off, Stanley Yelnats' Survival Guide to Camp Green Lake, in 2003, the author did not publish another full-length novel in the eight years following *Holes*. He admitted in 2006 that "being caught up in the whirlwind of Hollywood" during the making of the film *Holes* was a distraction that made it hard to get back into the mindset of writing. During a particularly frustrating part of the film's production, Sachar said he worked for a few weeks on "a follow-up novel that had [Holes characters] X-Ray complaining to Armpit about Hollywood ripping off their story." In 2006, he released the full-length novel Small Steps, which features some of the characters from Holes.

When asked in 2006 about his plans for the future, Sachar replied, "I doubt I will write any more about the Holes characters....I don't have any current plans to [write more Wayside School stories], but I imagine I will someday."

What If...

In *Holes*, key events in the past affect the lives of characters in the present - Stanley believes he is cursed because of the choices made by his great-great great grandfather Elya. But how would the outcome of the story change if certain events were altered? Chose one of the options below and write a short scene exploring a different reality. Have other students act out the scene for the class.

- 1. Elya Yelnats kept his promise to Madame Zeroni and carried her up the mountain what would Madame Zeroni do next?
- 2. Zero did not steal (or was not caught stealing) a pair of shoes from the mall. Where might he end up instead of Camp Green Lake?
- 3. After Stanley and Hector escape Camp Green Lake, what would happen if they did not return to dig the last hole?


Glossary

Here is a list of some of the terms used in the theatre to help your students learn more about theatre and its terms.

Director - the person who oversees the entire artistic process of staging a production
Actor - a person who performs a role or character
Character - a person in a play or story; the part played by an actor
Playwright - author of a play
Costume - any clothing an actor wears onstage for a performance
Dialogue - the lines of the play spoken by the actors in character
Gesture - an expressive movement of the body, face, or limbs
Plot - the sequence of events; the structure of a play, including the exposition, inciting incident, rising action, climax, falling action, and denouement

Role - a part an actor portrays in a play that is written by the playwright


Open Response Question Scoring

- 4 The response demonstrates consistent use and knowledge of the specific element and relates it to the show with a clear positive/negative attribute. The response demonstrates effective communication skills and provides insightful use of supporting examples and relevant details from the show.
- **3** The response exhibits a mediocre understanding of a specific scenic element and how it affects the story. The response demonstrates some knowledge of the specific element and relates it to the show with a clear positive/negative attribute. The response demonstrates effective communication skills, with use of supporting examples and relevant details from the show.
- 2 The response exhibits a limited understanding of a specific scenic element and how it affects the story. The response demonstrates little knowledge and insight into how the specific element relates to the show and uses a vague positive/ negative attribute to support it. The response may include errors or misconceptions. The response communicates on a basic level, with limited use of supporting examples and relevant details from the show.
- 1 The response is not able to identify correctly any of the scenic elements and how it affects the story. The response demonstrates little to no knowledge and insight into how the specific element relates to the show and unclear or no positive/negative attributes to support it. The response includes errors or misconceptions. The response demonstrates ineffective communication skills with little or no use of supporting examples and relevant details from the show.

Answers to "Figure It Out" Math Section:

- 1. The formula for finding the volume of a cynlinder is $v=\pi r^2 d$ which makes the equation we need to solve: $\pi(2.5^2)(5)$. The answer is 98.175.
- 2. West Virginia is the answer, coming in at 24,231 square miles.
- 3. If 100 miles is the radius, then the diameter would be 2 multiplied by the radius (d=2r), which would make it 200 miles. The formula for finding the circumference of a circle is: $2\pi r$ making the circumference of Green Lake 628.319 miles.

Stanley Yelnats' Survival Guide to Camp Green Lake: A Holes companion book by Louis Sachar. Should you ever find yourself at Camp Green Lake — or somewhere similar — this is the guide for you. Stanley (Caveman, to some of you) offers anecdotes and advice to help make your stay a more pleasant one.

Small Steps by Louis Sachar: Two years after being released from Camp Green Lake, Armpit is trying to turn his life around. But it's hard when you have a record, and everyone expects the worst from you.

Maniac Magee by Jerry Spinelli: He came into this world named Jeffrey Lionel Magee, but when his parents died and his life changed, so did his name. And Maniac Magee became a legend. Al Capone Does My Shirts by Gennifer Choldenko: Moose's family moves to Alcatraz Island so his father can work as a guard and his sister Natalie can attend a special school in San Francisco. All Moose wants to do is protect Natalie, live up to his parents' expectations, and stay out of trouble. But on Alcatraz, trouble is never very far away.

Hatchet by Gary Paulsen: Stranded in the Canadian wilderness with only the clothes on his back and a hatchet, Brian Robeson must put his bitter thoughts of his parents' divorce behind and deal with trying to stay alive.
